The meeting was called to order at 7:14 PM by the Society President Ron Hawes. There were approximately 16 members and 2 quests in attendance. The meeting was held under the entryway of the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship Church as the key was temporarily unavailable.

Officer Reports

Ben Steelman – Treasurer

Provided the Treasurers report by indicating the club was still solvent. The club's checking account balance is approximately \$1,900 with deposits pending.

Ric Longren – Newsletter Editor

Indicated the need for an updated membership list.

Old Business

Club Shirts - Jonathon Guetta announced that club T- and sweatshirts could now be ordered. Multiple orders were placed with Jonathan that evening and he invited others to order email. A motion was made, seconded and approved that the club purchase a 10 T shirts of (5 large and 5 XL) for future use at the club's discretion. Available sizes were to be clarified by Jonathan.

New Business

Boy Scout Meetings - President Ron Hawes reported successful presentations to the Boy Scouts at Camp McNeal by himself, Jonathon Guetta and others. Approximately 40-50 Scouts were present for a variety of topics including a solar system tour and constellations. The program was well received by the Scouts. Additional events were planned.

Cape Fear Museum - President Ron Hawes announced receipt of a letter from the director of the Cape Fear Museum outlining an upcoming program titled "Cape Fear Skies" (not to be confused with the CFAS Newsletter of the same name!). Participation of club members in a Telescope Clinic is requested by the museum. Details, such as the exact date and time, were to be clarified by Ron and brought to the next meeting or posted.

Our Sister Society - Club member Thad Coin reported contact with the Secretary of our Sister Society in Australia, the Astronomical Society of Albury – Wodonga (ASAW), due to participation in an Australian on-line amateur astronomy forum "Ice In Space." Their Secretary, Petra de Ruyter, noted that they had lost contact with us and very much wanted re-establish a regular interchange. An interesting discussion regarding the history of association of the two Societies and methods of contact ensued. It was agreed that Thad would return the greetings and best wishes and establish guidelines in the exchange of club newsletters and contact. Viewing Reports

Member Thad Coin gave an addendum to the report of the last Yamacraw session (see March newletter). The impressive largest of globular clusters, Omega Centauri, was glimpsed through binoculars about 3 degrees above the Southern horizon treetops at 4am (after telescopes had been packed up!). This should be a worthy target for the Yamacraw site or possibly beach sites over the next few months. Tom Jacobs brought up some recently published science regarding the cluster: a mid-sized black hole of about 40.000 solar masses lurks at its center.

The business meeting was adjourned. The evening's presentation by Steve Clemmons (who attended Gastronomy and the business meeting) was rescheduled due to lack of access to the meeting room. Members thanked Steve for his effort and appreciated his gracious offer to reschedule.





take left onto Rooks Road (dirt).

Follow Rooks Road .8 miles around curve, pass bus shelter and take left onto our site's road. Travel .1 mile, unlock/relock gate, travel .6 miles, take 2nd right. Follow Battleground Rd .5 miles, take sharp left onto Slocum Rd, follow for 2.3 miles. Take a right onto Pt. Caswell Rd, follow .7 miles past Church, take right onto Rooks Road (dirt). Follow Rooks Rd .6 miles, turn right onto our site's road. (If you see the bus shelter, you've gone too far.) Travel .1 miles, unlock/relock gate, travel .6 miles, take the 2nd road on the right to our site.
